Individuals must meet eligibility criteria

To be eligible for LCBDD, a child needs to complete a COEDI at age 6 for services until age 16 and a OEDI at age 16 for services from age 16 and older.

- The individual must have a documented qualifying diagnosis of a developmental disability, made by a qualified professional.
- The individual must have a physical or mental impairment other than mental illness.
- The onset of disability must be documented to show it was manifested prior to the age of 22.
- The individual's disability must be likely to continue indefinitely.
- The individual must be a resident of Lake County.



Lake County Board of DD/Deepwood will need:

- Verification of a qualifying diagnosis current within one year--If your child is still in school, a current ETR and IEP are needed
- Guardianship/Custodial Documents
- Verification of Date of Birth
- Verification of Social Security Number
- Insurance Cards
- NOTE: Timelines have changed recently



- The transition plan should equally address Independent Living, Education/Training, and Employment
- Different students will require a variety of different activities in these three areas depending on their needs and their long term goal. Success will look very different for each graduate.
- Transition assessments will help to determine Preferences, Interests, Needs, and Strengths related to all three of those areas. Transition activities should be implemented by team members for each of the areas, each year.



More on Transition Planning and the IEP

 The IEP team, along with staff from supporting agencies, is able to talk through community resources and program options with you so that you are best prepared for your child's transition.







- Communicate preferences, interests, strengths, areas of need, types of support, how progressing
- Participate actively in discussions, decisions, planning activities, IEP development, IEP meetings and IEP implementation





- Support the student
- Provide information about the student's strengths, interests, needs, independent living skills, and kinds of support needed to achieve desired post high school outcomes
- Be actively engaged as equal partners in planning, discussions, and decision making
- Participate in making referrals to adult service agencies and training programs
- Provide opportunities for the child to practice adult roles and responsibilities





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- Provide information about the student's strengths, achievements, progress on IEP goals, and strategies for teaching student
- Assist student in identifying postsecondary goals
- Prepare student and family for their leadership role in the transition process
- Suggest courses of study and educational experiences
- Identify needed personnel from school, related services, and community agencies
- Provide input and incorporate into IEP transition service needs and post-school agencies, services, and/or supports
- Link student and parents to post high school services/supports
- Coordinate all people, agencies, services, or programs
- Monitor student progress



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- Assist student in identifying postsecondary goals
- Assist in planning courses of study in general education curriculum; identify and provide modifications, adaptations, and supports; and identify and provide positive behavioral strategies and interventions
- Monitor student progress

- Support special and general education staff

Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities

- Empowering Ohioans with disabilities through employment, disability determinations, and independence
- Vocational Rehabilitation Counselors are available at OOD offices located throughout the state of Ohio to assist individuals with disabilities. Counselors at these local offices can assist individuals with disabilities determine if they qualify to receive services from OOD.
- Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) provides counseling and guidance to individuals with disabilities who are seeking employment to jointly choose an employment goal based on strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, capabilities and interests. A thorough, objective understanding of your assets and liabilities, and of employment opportunities, is a prerequisite in planning.



OOD and DODD Partnership



Employment First should produce opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities to obtain jobs that they have chosen and feel comfortable doing (self-determination), are situated in locations typical of that kind of work (community-based), provide compensation on par with their non-disabled counterparts in like positions (competitive employment), and are performed alongside co-workers without disabilities (integrated setting). A policy or initiative which produces an outcome that lack one or more of these pillars should not be considered true Employment First.

- This could be a Speech-Language Pathologist, Occupational Therapist, or Guidance Counselor from the school team, should there be a need in one or more of these areas
- This could be an OOD vendor/provider, should the student have services with a provider included in their employment plan
- This could be the Employment
 Navigator SSA, should your student be
 on the path to employment or a
 caseload SSA from the LCBDD, should
 your student have a waiver prior to
 graduation.
- This could be anyone the family/student gives permission to attend





Those on the path to employment

- All students are presumed to be competitively employable. Many factors come into play to determine if a student is ready for competitive employment.
- It is important to include outside agencies such at LCBDD, if eligible, and Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) in transition, as well as, completing Age Appropriate Transition Assessments.
- Following graduation, it may be necessary to continue working on vocational skills in a supported setting prior to obtaining a job.





What is the role of the Service & Support Administration Employment Navigator?

The Employment Navigator works within an individual's team to help prepare and educate the job seeker through the process of obtaining desired employment. The primary function of the Employment Navigator is to assist in the planning, coordinating and monitoring of employment-related supports by service providers to reach desired employment outcomes.

What are the benefits of Employment Navigation?

The Employment Navigator may be able to help with the following:

- Attend team meetings
- Assist with education of valuable internet resources for job development/career planning and identify potential career paths and employment outcomes
- Provide information and referrals to community resources
- Help provide linkage to adult vocational and/or non-vocational programs
- Follow along and monitoring of plan and progress toward desired employment outcomes



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Who receives Employment Navigation Services?

Employment Navigation is available to individuals who have been determined eligible for services through the County Board. Individuals are post high school, or within transition from high school, to community employment.



Continuum of Transition Options



*Employment First Rule: 5123:2-2-05

Notes:

- An individual is able to move back and forth on this continuum at any time.
- Adult Day Services and Vocational Habilitation are paid for through the Medicaid Waiver Program.
- DODD options available on DODD Provider Options: Post Graduation handout
- Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) may be available to provide vocational rehabilitation services to eligible individuals.
- OOD/VR service options found on OOD handouts
- An individual can be paid at sub-minimum wage under Vocational Habilitation, if provider has certificate from Department of Labor. This needs to be taken into consideration, if an individual is under 24 years old.

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The following steps can be used as a guide as you find and talk to potential providers.

1. Search for Providers

- A list of OOD-approved providers can be found on OOD's website: https://prd.ood.ohio.gov/providersearch/
- Once on the *Provider Search page*, you can search for providers based on the provider's name, your location, and the type(s) of service(s) you need.

2. Narrow down your options by gathering more information.

(NOTE: if you need assistance with how to start this process, please contact your counselor)

- Review the Provider Scorecards (found on the Provider Search page) which have information about:
 - o the people the provider serves (by disability, race/ethnicity, gender, etc.); and
 - o the results of the provider's job placement services (by job type, hours, wages, etc.).
- Talk directly to potential providers.
 - Here are some helpful hints if you choose to talk directly to providers.

Be prepared to talk about yourself.	You may also ask providers questions like:
For example: ➤ the kind of job you want; ➤ the amount of money you would like to earn; ➤ where you are willing to go to work; and ➤ what kind of job(s) you have done in the past.	 How will you help me find a job? How often will we talk while I am receiving services? What do you expect me to do as part of my services? Who will I be working with in your organization? What are the qualifications of your staff?

Should your student be eligible for OOD and want to use services you will need to pick a provider.

3. Choose your best match and tell your counselor.



- Provide information about services and eligibility criteria.
- Help develop a Transition Plan for life after high school.
- Provide information and referral to community resources.
- Help provide linkage to Adult Services.





Transition Services

What is the benefit of Transition Services?

The transition from High School to Adulthood can be challenging for individuals who have disabilities. In order to better serve a student, we have developed Transition Services.

Transition Services partners with individuals, their families, local educational entities, and other service providers in order to better plan for individual's transition from High School to Adult Services and provides guidance throughout the process.

How can Transition Services help?

The Transition SSA may be able to help with the following:

- Attend IEP meetings
- Help develop a Transition Plan for life after high school
- Provide information and referral to community resources
- Help provide linkage to adult services

- ⇒ VOCATIONAL HABILITATION time limited and provide opportunities to learn and gain new experiences, including volunteering, in order to develop general and transferrable employment-related skills
- ⇒ INDIVIDUAL EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT outcome is to support sustained competitive, integrated employment including customized and self-employment
- ⇒ GROUP EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT provided in a community setting for groups of workers with disabilities who have paid employment and work experiences
- ⇒ CAREER PLANNING outcome of the career planning service is the attainment of competitive, integrated employment or career advancement in a competitive, integrated job. If you need a ride-
- ⇒ NON-MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION (NMT) transportation to waiver services.

Ohio Employment First Transition Framework is a critical component to the Ohio Employment First structure and is intended to address barriers to transition planning and services in order to achieve meaningful adult outcomes. The Framework was developed by stakeholders from multiple agencies to create processes and highlight practices that can be used by all agencies. These common processes assist professionals to plan, prepare, empower, educate, and connect across systems so as to consistently assist youth with disabilities to realize meaningful, community employment and other valued aspects of adult life

The Framework is built on three non-negotiable foundational elements that together create a 'filter' to examine the practices and procedures used when working and supporting transition youth. The foundational elements for the activity and practices of the Framework are:

- Person-centered
- Agency-neutral
- Outcome-focused

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




Integrated Long Term Support Needs - Before and After Integrated Supports

Not every child or youth with a learning challenge or a disability is eligible for special education services. If a disability is suspected the school must determine:

- · If the disability is meets the criteria of one of the 13 disability categories defined in the Individuals with Disability Education Act (IDEA)
- If the child demonstrates an Agency Navigation Tool educational need that requires
 - That the disability is not the result of a lack of basic instruction in reading or math or the child's limited English

That the disability is not the result of a lack of basic instruction in reading or math or the child's limited English proficiency.

IDEA requires that school teams complete an evaluation process to determine if the student is eligible for services. This is the Evaluation Team Report or ETR This evaluation many consist of both formal and informal assessments, records review. and observation. Results of the ETR are reviewed to determine eligibility.

Service Overview

If found eligible for special education services, the team then must develop the special education plan that identifies the needed specialized instruction, services and supports that will assist the student to progress in the general curriculum. This is the Individualized Education Program or IEP.

Services identified in IDEA that a student may be eligible for as part of the IEP include:

- · Specially designed instruction
- Related services*
- Assistive technology
- Modifications
- Accommodations
- · Supplementary aids and services

*including, but not limited to, services such as speech-language therapy, and occupational or physical therapy. There are exceptions to what can be provided. All IEP related inquiries should be discussed at the IEP planning meetings and are ultimately an

At age 14, or younger, if appropriate, the student served by an IEP must also have in place Postsecondary Transition Goals (adult life goals) identified by transition assessments that are then linked to needed transition services. These services are documented on the Transition. Section of the IEP and inform the focus of the other aspects of the IEP as the student moves towards graduation and adult life.

Transition services are:

- a coordinated set of activities
- that promote movement from school to such post-school activities as post-secondary education, vocational training, employment, adult services, independent living and community participation.
- . Are based on the individual student's needs, taking into account his or her preferences and interests.

Transition services include instruction, community experiences, and development of competitive, integrated employment, adult education and independent living goals or outcomes.




